ABSTRACT

This payer describes the development of a best or action managemial model for Web b cultural events. A theoretical model, comprising four stages: decision; plansing implementation; evaluation, was weatherized from an extensize review of the literature. The theoretical model was then send as a projective instrument for in-depth intoviews with managers of three Welsh cultural events: Llangollen International Music Festival, the May Fair of the Museum of Webh Life, and the Undd Esteddfod. From the interviews, three reasonably similar practical models were developed. These late models were then unified in a single best practice model, through the use of Delphi technique. The initial decision phase for the first year of each event differed markedly between events. However the event managers were able to achieve comemos on a best practice annual managerial model for cultural





"It's not just pretty. It's an industry. Whilst you're coming to a rural area you shouldn't think that you're coming to necessarily recreational land. ... 
